FIELD RESEARCH

August 2009 to October 2010, May 2011 - Field Research in Buenos Aires, Córdoba, San Luis and Misiones, Argentina: I conducted a survey experiment in which 800 individuals were surveyed. The sample consisted of municipal-level party operatives: city council members and their brokers. For this project, I wrote research budgets. I co-authored the survey instrument, and planned its experimental design. I devised sampling strategies for a population of informal political actors. I trained survey enumerators in 2 provinces, managed survey enumerators on a daily basis in Buenos Aires, and personally conducted surveys in all 4 provinces. In Córdoba and Misiones, I worked with academic partners, and in all provinces, I built trust with many actors in the field who ranged from local municipal employees to mayors of large cities. In addition to the survey, I conducted over 50 open-ended interviews, and engaged in participant observation that ranged from attending political rallies to observing brokers organize voters.

Spring 2007 - Field Research in New Haven, Connecticut: I conducted semi-structured interviews with government elites and community activists regarding opposition to a sewage incineration plant.

June to July 2006 - Field Research in Santiago and Vallenar, Chile: I conducted semi-structured interviews with government elites, community activists and community members regarding the planning for and the opposition to the Pascua-Lama Mine.
